

The By-Laws of The International Behaviorology Institute (TIBI) promote a scientific "Behavior Literacy graduation requirement of appropriate content and depth at all levels of educational institutions from kindergarten through

university." For this to be possible, and to ensure that behaviorology makes its full contributions to humanity, society needs many more trained behaviorologists. One purpose of TIBI is to help achieve these goals.

The Institute operates within the framework of American higher education. This system has the four basic degree levels of Associate,

Baccalaureate, Masters, and Doctorate. Within this overall structure, the Institute runs several certificate programs. The teaching and organization of these programs stress contingency—based instructional design and technology derived from the contingency analysis in behaviorological science.



The Institute designs its programs to deliver increasingly comprehensive training in the foundations and practices of behaviorologists. The programs serve a number of audiences. These range from (a) those who wish to fulfill a minimal *Behavior Literacy* graduation requirement, to (b) those who are majoring in behaviorology at an undergraduate level, to (c) those who seek specialty certificates in

verbal behavior, or autism interventions, or companion animal training, to (d) those who, as professionals working or studying in another discipline or field, would inform their efforts (e.g., to solve global problems) with input from behaviorology, to (e) those who are studying behaviorology at the graduate level.

These certificate programs incorporate scientifically sound instructional design components including (a) managing contingencies through which students meet established criteria, (b) allowing students some leeway in completing courses at their own pace, and (c) encouraging students to begin their next course immediately, without reference to calendar semesters. The courses, and the contents of courses, required for each of these certificates will evolve as behaviorology itself evolves (hence these program descriptions are subject to change).
